# BACKGROUND TO TOUR


Student leaders in the Cumbria Community College (UK) forestry program took the initiative to design a tour of BC forestry in an effort to augment their course work and to build upon their exposure to forest management and production practices in major forest regions. The group, comprised of 23 students and 2 faculty, raised the funds for the BC tour.


While in BC the group examined commercial forestry in both the Interior and Coastal regions. BC companies and the Ministry of Forests cooperated with the students to provide forest tours and demonstrations on various management practices. Information was also provided on BC's forest regulations and government programs.


Industry and Trade, Pacific Forestry Centre, Forestry Canada was asked by External Affairs and International Trade Canada to meet and debrief with the UK students at the end of the tour. Industry and Trade designed and delivered a questionnaire to the UK tour group in an effort to examine attitudes toward various forest management aspects and the impact of the tour on these attitudes. The results of this questionnaire are presented in this report.


# **SURVEY HIGHLIGHTS**


- impression on BC forest management dramatically improved after the tour for all UK participants
- major UK sources of info. on BC/Cdn. forestry are ENGO's and newspapers
- BC/Cdn. forestry management aspects of greatest concern to UK consumers are the preservation of Old Growth, forest sustainability and clear-cutting
- respondents accepted the scientific merit of clear-cutting, accepted harvesting native forests due to renewability, and agreed with shift to plantation forestry
- respondents agreed with more Old Growth preservation and reduction in pollution
- respondents selected public credibility and Old Growth preservation as the BC forest management aspects needing improvement the most
- respondents had exposure to forestry in many of the European and Scandinavian countries











